Kindergarten 2022 – Updated COVID Safe Orientation Program

Enrolments and Orientation Programs – Updated Department Advice:

- > The orientation and transition guidelines are now available.
 - New enrolment interviews will be booked when all enrolment form documentation is completed. Enrolment forms can be completed online via our website at: <u>merimbula-p.school@det.nsw.edu.au</u>
 - Documentation can be submitted online or via the drop box at our gate (or by having someone from the office meet you at the gate for a contactless drop-off) and should be accompanied by: 100 points of proof of address, an immunisation certificate, birth certificate and additional support needs information provided prior to interview.
- At this time we are not permitted to hold any enrolment interviews on-site. This will be the same under Level 2 restrictions. All interviews will be held via phone or zoom. For families with previously scheduled enrolment interview times, your times will stay the same. We will be in contact with you to see if you would prefer a phone or Zoom interview.



Education



Schools operating under Level 3 and Level 2 settings can conduct orientation and transition activities on the school site with restrictions, in align with COVID-Safe practices, as follows:

Parents and carers are only permitted to drop off and pick up their child and must not remain on-site.

For orientation visits to take place within the school, the following requirements must be in place:

- All students <u>attending the orientation</u> must have all previously mentioned documentation provided to the school. This will also mean that any relevant Health Care Plans, Asthma Action Plans, Emergency Care Plans, Asthma/Anaphylaxis medication provisions, Support Plans, Toileting Plans and other resources are completed and on-site at the time of each visit.
- Risk Assessments for any student with additional learning, health or behavioural needs must have been completed by the school and signed off on by the parent/caregiver/s.
- Parents/caregivers must confirm that their child/ren are free of any flu-like symptoms.
- Parents/carers are to report to a designated drop-off and collection zone for orientations, which may be onsite, but should not stay on site for more than 10 minutes. Crowding must be reduced and physical distancing markers in place where people are asked to queue. Orientation/transition visit times must be after the regular school start time as to avoid congestion and interaction between students attending the orientation and those already attending the school.





Orientation visits must have staggered start and finish times to limit the number of people on-site and to prevent queueing.

- Orientation visits must promote good hygiene (including the wiping of pens, provision of sanitiser and soap/paper towels in bathrooms and the wiping down of equipment/high touch areas after use).
- Parents/caregivers coming on-site for 10 minutes to drop children off at the orientation must:
- Maintain physical distancing of 1.5m;
- Sign an External Visitor's Form and check in using a QR Code;
- Follow the relevant advice for the Merimbula / Bega Valley location, including wearing a mask if required;
- A record of names/attendees and contact details for parents/carers on-site will be maintained and kept for 28 days after the event for the purpose of contact tracing.
- Adopt and promote good hand hygiene practices.
- Not access areas outside of the drop-off/collection zone.
- Leave immediately after the orientation (and avoid mingling with other parents/caregivers onsite/at the parking areas).

Prior To School Settings

TRAVEL TO AND FROM SCHOOL

Rural and regional school travel

Apply online for free school travel in rural and regional NSW. You only need to complete one form, even for journeys using more than one operator.

Who can apply?

To be eligible for free school travel, students may need to live a minimum distance from their school:

Years K-2 (Infants) There is no minimum distance.

Years 3-6 (Primary) More than 1.6km straight line distance or at least 2.3km walking.

Years 7-12 (Secondary)

More than 2.0km straight line distance or at least 2.9km walking.

Who needs to apply

You only need to apply if the student has never been approved for free school travel before. Students in a shared parental responsibility situation (e.g. joint custody) should submit a separate application for both addresses.

How to update your details

You need to update student details online if the student is changing their name, address, school or campus, or their Transport operator. You can update them at apps.transport.nsw.gov.au/ssts/ updatedetails#/updateDetails



How to apply for free travel for the first time You can apply for free school travel for next year

from the start of Term 4 this year.

Step 1 Once you have enrolled your child at the new school, apply online by giving your home address and telling us which bus company the student needs to travel with between home and school. You can apply online at apps.transport.nsw.gov.au/ssts/home#/ howToApply

Step 2

The school then confirms to us that your details are correct.

Step 3

We will then work on your application. You will get an email confirming if the student is approved for free travel. If so, we will tell your local bus company who may send a school travel pass (if needed) to your school or, in some cases, the bus company will contact you directly about travel arrangements

A parent or guardian must apply for students aged 15 years and under. Students who are 16 years and over must apply for themselves.

- All Kindergarten children (and those from K-2) 0 are able to get free bus travel (to/from school). There is no minimum distance.

- Assisted transport funding can be applied for if Ο your child lives beyond walking access to a bus stop. See our Administration Staff (Mrs Jackie Roberts) for details.
- Our staff put symbols on students' hands in Term Ο 1, so that they can be supported in getting to the correct line/area: 15=Bus Numbers/P = Pick Up / W = Walking Line









YOUR CHILD'S BELONGINGS

 Use a permanent laundry marker to label clothes, hats and shoes, or sew or iron on personalised labels.

 Go through your child's bag with them each night, check for notes & check that labels haven't faded with washing.

 If something doesn't come home, ask at the office where the school's lost property area is.

A SMOOTH START – SCHOOL TIMES

 Children and are always supervised by qualified teachers, whether they are in the classroom or on the playground.

 School starts at <u>8.55am (bell rings)</u> for all students and ends at <u>2.55 pm</u>.

• Teachers are on duty/supervising from <u>8.25am</u>. Students should not arrive before this time. There is no supervision after 2.55pm, therefore the equipment/play areas cannot be used.

 In 2022, we will be again be ringing the morning bell at <u>8.55am</u>. Kindergarten to Year 2 students take part in a daily gross motor program at this time.

• We are hoping to have our own **Out of School Hours Care** running, before 2022. Please complete our OSHC Survey today to assist us in this regard.

Our **Before School, After School and Vacation Care** will by operated by OUR staff, for OUR students. Only Merimbula PS students will attend this service.









A SMOOTH START – SCHOOL ACTIVITIES

Children have their "Home Class Teacher" for all activities except:

○ If the teacher is absent/released for professional learning courses;

 When their teacher has Duties Other Than Teaching (DoT). During this time your child will attend the following weekly activities:

 Media and Text Studies – with a librarian (to learn and borrow), Mrs Feneck or Mrs Pearce.

✓ Japanese and Asian Cultural Studies – With Sensai Fowler (Mrs Amanda Fowler).



✓ In 2021, Kindy students also have PE and music with a specialist teacher 2022 curricular programs will be confirmed in the coming months.



A SMOOTH START

- Your child is not expected to be able to read or write before starting school.
- It would be helpful if he/she could recognise their name.
- If you spend some time with your child reading and doing other fun activities, they will be off to a great start.
- The main thing is that your child feels confident about starting school.
- Please do not teach them to write their name all in capital letters. If teaching them to write their name, please only capitalise the first letter.







MATHEMATICS

- Some tips for helping you child with numeracy:
 - <u>Use objects</u> fingers or blocks so you child can see and count one at a time.
 - <u>Play games</u> such as dominoes, snakes and ladders, card games or board games involving dice. This will help your child to recognise patterns and to count.
 - <u>Shapes</u> Look at the shape of objects in the home or garden, see what shapes your child can recognise, eg: the roof is a triangle.

- Some tips for helping you child with Literacy
 - <u>Read aloud</u> to your child every day. Try use different voices, lots of emotion, use sound effects and funny faces. Change the tone in your voice, vary the loudness or softness.
 - <u>Talk with your child</u> about the meaning of a book you have just read or ask them about different ways to solve a problem.
 - <u>Practice</u> reading and writing at home, eg making grocery lists, writing the alphabet, playing word games such as Boggle.

What is InitiaLit?

InitiaLit is an evidence-based whole-class literacy program which will provide all children with the essential core knowledge and strong foundations to become successful readers and writers. InitiaLit is a three-year program, covering the first three years of school (typically Foundation to Year 2). InitiaLit-Foundation was released in 2017, InitiaLit-I in 2018 and InitiaLit-2 in 2019.

Initial: th marks a departure from remedial literacy education for MultiLit, instead addressing initial instruction in the hope that by providing strong foundations in reading and writing from the outset, fewer children will fall behind and require more intervention.

In the context of a Response to Intervention approach, InitiaLit is a Tier 1 program, designed to be delivered to whole classes by classroom teachers.

What is InitiaLit-Foundation?

InitiaLit–Foundation (InitiaLit–F) offers an explicit and effective model for teaching reading and related skills to children in their first year of schooling in a fun and engaging way.

The program incorporates daily lessons in phonemic awareness, reading and spelling as well as rich language instruction using children's literature. A set of decodable readers, InitiaLit Readers (Levels 1-9), which are aligned to the instructional sequence, accompany the program cabling additionable sequence, accompany the program cabling additionable sequence.

The InitiaLit-F approach

InitiaLit-F incorporates the key components necessary for early reading instruction – phonemic awareness, phonics, fluency, vocabulary and comprehension. It is implemented except the functional of the Faundation user.

Helping Your Child At Home.

As a parent, you are your child's first and most important teacher. When parents and families are involved with their child's school, the children do better and have better feelings about going to school.
